

**CHARTER OF THE AUDIT COMMITTEE OF  
THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF  
CERENCE INC.  
(As Amended April 2024)**

**1. Purpose**

- 1.1. The purpose of the Audit Committee (the “**Committee**”) of the Board of Directors (the “**Board**”) of Cerence Inc. (the “**Company**”) shall be to:
  - 1.1.1. Oversee the accounting and financial reporting processes of the Company and audits of the financial statements of the Company;
  - 1.1.2. Assist the Board in oversight and monitoring of (i) the integrity of the Company’s financial statements, (ii) the Company’s compliance with legal and regulatory requirements, (iii) the independent auditor’s qualifications, independence and performance, and (iv) the Company’s internal accounting and financial controls;
  - 1.1.3. Provide the Company’s Board with the results of its monitoring and recommendations derived therefrom; and
  - 1.1.4. Provide to the Board such additional information and materials as it may deem necessary to make the Board aware of significant financial matters that require the attention of the Board.
- 1.2. In addition, the Committee will undertake those specific duties and responsibilities listed below and such other duties as the Board may from time to time prescribe, or as may be required by law from time to time.
- 1.3. The Board and management shall ensure that the Committee has adequate funding and other resources and authority to discharge its responsibilities as determined by the Committee.
- 1.4. While the Committee has the responsibilities and authority set forth in this Charter, it is not the duty of the Committee to plan or conduct audits of the Company’s financial statements or its internal control over financial reporting or to determine that the Company’s financial statements are complete and are in accordance with generally accepted auditing principles. This is the responsibility of management and the independent auditor. Nor is it the duty of the Committee to assure compliance with laws or regulations or the Company’s code of business conduct and ethics.

**2. Membership & Organization**

- 2.1. The Committee will consist of at least three members of the Board, all of whom in the judgment of the Board shall be independent in accordance with the listing standards of the Nasdaq Stock Market, except as otherwise permitted by the rules of the Nasdaq Stock Market and the rules of the Securities and Exchange Commission (“**SEC**”) as may be in effect from time to time. Each member shall in the judgment of the Board have the ability to read and understand the Company’s financial statements. At least one member of the Committee shall in the judgment

of the Board be an “audit committee financial expert” in accordance with the rules and regulations of the SEC and at least one member (who may also serve as the Committee’s financial expert) shall in the judgment of the Board have accounting or related financial management expertise in accordance with the listing standards of the Nasdaq Stock Market. In addition, Committee members will satisfy any additional requirements mandated by rules and regulations of the SEC or the listing standards of the Nasdaq Stock Market. The Committee will review its membership annually for compliance with the above requirements.

- 2.2. The members of the Committee will be appointed by the Board on the recommendation of the Nominating and Governance Committee and will serve at the discretion of the Board. The Board shall designate one member of the Committee to serve as chair.

### **3. Responsibilities**

In addition to such other responsibilities as may be delegated to the Committee from time-to-time by the Board, the Committee shall:

- 3.1. Review the adequacy of the Company’s system of internal controls, including meeting periodically with the Company’s management and the independent auditors to review the adequacy of such controls and to review before release the disclosure regarding such system of internal controls required under SEC rules to be contained in the Company’s periodic filings and the attestations or reports by the independent auditors relating to such disclosure;
- 3.2. Pre-approve all audit and non-audit services and related engagement fees and terms for services provided to the Company by the independent auditors (or subsequently approve non-audit services in those circumstances where a subsequent approval is necessary and permissible);
- 3.3. Review and provide guidance with respect to the external audit and the Company’s relationship with its independent auditors including by: (1) reviewing the independent auditors’ proposed audit scope, approach and independence; (2) obtaining on a periodic basis a statement from the independent auditors regarding relationships and services with the Company which may impact independence or objectivity, and to the extent there are relationships, monitoring and investigating such relationships, including actively engaging in a dialogue with the independent auditors with respect to any disclosed relationships or services that may impact the objectivity and independence of the independent auditors, and presenting such information to the Board; (3) receiving and reviewing a report by the independent auditors describing any material issues raised by the most recent internal quality control review, or peer review, of the independent auditing firm, or by any inquiry or investigation by governmental or professional authorities and any steps taken to deal with any such issues; (4) discussing with the Company’s independent auditors the financial statements and audit findings, including any significant adjustments, management judgments and accounting estimates, significant new accounting policies, any alternative treatments of financial information within generally accepted accounting principles that the independent auditor has discussed with management, ramifications of the use of these

alternative disclosures and the treatment preferred by the independent auditor and disagreements with management and any other matters described in PCAOB Auditing Standard 1301, as may be modified or supplemented (“**AS 1301**”) or any successor standard; and (5) reviewing reports submitted to the Committee by the independent auditors in accordance with the applicable SEC requirements and other legal or regulatory requirements;

- 3.4. Recommend to the Board as to whether the Company’s audited financial statements should be included in the Company’s Annual Report on Form 10-K based on the Committee’s review and discussions (1) with management of the audited financial statements, (2) with the independent auditor of the matters required to be discussed by AS 1301, and (3) with the independent auditor concerning the independent auditor’s independence;
- 3.5. Review and discuss with management and the independent auditors the annual audited financial statements and quarterly unaudited financial statements, including: (1) the Company’s disclosures under “Management’s Discussion and Analysis of Financial Condition and Results of Operations,” (2) all critical accounting policies and practices used by the Company, (3) all alternative accounting treatments of financial information reported in GAAP related to material items that have been discussed with management, including the ramifications of the use of such alternative treatments and disclosures and the treatment preferred by the Company’s independent auditor, (4) any reports or communications (and management’s responses thereto) submitted to the Committee by the Company’s independent auditor in accordance with AS 1301, and (5) any other material written communications between the Company’s independent auditor and management, prior to filing the Company’s Annual Report on Form 10-K and Quarterly Reports on Form 10-Q, respectively, with the SEC;
- 3.6. Review and discuss with management and the Company’s independent auditor (1) major issues regarding, or significant changes in, the Company’s accounting principles and financial statement presentations, (2) analyses prepared by management or the Company’s independent auditor concerning significant financial reporting issues and judgments made in connection with the preparation of the financial statements, (3) the effect of regulatory and accounting initiatives, as well as off-balance sheet structures, on the financial statements of the Company, and (4) the type of information to be included in earnings press releases and any financial information and earnings guidance provided to analysts and rating agencies;
- 3.7. Conduct a post-audit review of the financial statements and audit findings, including any significant suggestions for improvements provided to management by the independent auditors;
- 3.8. Review before release the unaudited quarterly operating results to be stated in the Company’s quarterly earnings release with particular attention to any use of “pro forma” or “adjusted” non-GAAP information;
- 3.9. Review and discuss with management and the Company’s independent auditors the preparation and content of any officer certifications required by the Sarbanes-Oxley Act or the SEC to be filed with the Company’s Quarterly Report on Form

10-Q, Annual Report on Form 10-K or any other periodic report;

- 3.10. Review and discuss with the independent auditors the report required to be delivered by such auditors pursuant to Section 10A(k) of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934;
- 3.11. Discuss with management and internal audit representatives the activities, organizational structure and qualifications of the Company's internal audit function;
- 3.12. Review any reports by management or internal auditors regarding the effectiveness of, or any deficiencies in, the design or operation of internal controls and any fraud, whether or not material, that involves management or other employees who have a significant role in the Company's internal controls and review before release the disclosure regarding the Company's system of internal controls required under SEC rules to be contained in the Company's periodic filings and the attestations or reports by the independent auditors relating to such disclosure;
- 3.13. Oversee compliance with legal requirements for disclosure of auditor's services and Committee members, member qualifications and activities;
- 3.14. Perform those functions delegated to the Committee set forth in the Company's Code of Business Conduct and Ethics;
- 3.15. Review, in conjunction with counsel, any legal matters that could have a significant impact on the Company's financial statements;
- 3.16. Provide oversight and review at least annually of the Company's financial risk management policies, including its investment policies;
- 3.17. If necessary, institute special investigations with full access to all books, records, facilities and personnel of the Company;
- 3.18. As appropriate, engage and obtain advice and assistance from outside legal, accounting or other advisors with funding to be provided by the Company;
- 3.19. Conduct appropriate review and oversight of related party transactions, as defined by applicable rules of the SEC and Nasdaq Stock Market, to which the Company is a party;
- 3.20. Review this charter and assess its adequacy, and assess the Committee's structure and processes, on an annual basis;
- 3.21. Provide a report in the Company's proxy statement in accordance with the rules and regulations of the SEC;
- 3.22. Establish, and periodically review, the procedures for receiving, retaining and treating complaints received by the Company regarding accounting, internal accounting controls or auditing matters and procedures for the confidential, anonymous submission by employees of concerns regarding questionable accounting or

auditing matters; and

- 3.23. Review and discuss with management, the independent auditor and the internal auditor, the Company's exposure to risk, including the Company's major financial risk exposures and cybersecurity risk exposures, and the steps management has taken to monitor, mitigate, and control such exposures.

#### **4. The Committee shall:**

- 4.1. Have the sole authority to appoint, compensate, retain, oversee the work of and to terminate the engagement of the independent auditors (including resolving disagreements between management and the independent auditors regarding financial reporting) for the purpose of preparing or issuing an audit report or related work;
- 4.2. Have the sole authority to approve the engagement of the Company's independent auditors to perform non-audit services (or subsequently approving non-audit services in those circumstances where a subsequent approval is necessary and permissible) and, in the exercise of such authority, the Committee (or a subcommittee comprised solely of Committee members) shall consider whether the provision of such services is compatible with maintaining the independence of the Company's independent auditors;
- 4.3. Have the authority to form, and delegate authority to, one or more subcommittees, comprised of one or more Committee members, which subcommittee(s) shall have the responsibilities and authority delegated to them, including, if so designated, the full responsibility and authority of the Committee with respect to delegated matters including, without limitation, authority to delegate to one or more designated members of the Committee the authority to pre-approve audit and permissible non-audit services, provided such pre-approval decision is presented to the full Committee at its scheduled meetings;
- 4.4. Have the authority to establish pre-approval policies for audit and permissible non-audit services to be performed by the Company's independent auditors that are detailed as to the particular services to which such policies would apply and include a requirement that the Committee be promptly informed of each service approved in accordance with such policies; and
- 4.5. Have the sole authority to obtain advice, reports or opinions from internal or external counsel and other expert advisors (collectively, "Advisors"), in each case at the Company's expense.

#### **5. Meetings & Minutes**

The Committee will meet at least four times each year. The Committee will meet separately with the Chief Executive Officer and separately with the Chief Financial Officer of the Company at such times as are appropriate to review the financial affairs of the Company. The Committee will meet separately with the independent auditors of the Company, at such times as it deems appropriate, but not less than quarterly, to fulfill the responsibilities of the Committee under this charter. The Committee will maintain written minutes of its meetings, which minutes will be filed with the minutes of the meetings of the Board.

Meetings may be held telephonically or by other electronic means to the extent permitted by the Company's organizational documents and applicable law. Committee actions may also be taken by unanimous written consent

## **6. Reports**

In addition to preparing the report for inclusion in the Company's proxy statement in accordance with the rules and regulations of the SEC, the Committee will make regular reports to the Board regarding its activities.

## **7. Compensation**

Members of the Committee shall receive such compensation, if any, for their service as Committee members in accordance with the Company's standard compensation arrangements for directors. Such compensation may include retainers or per meeting fees as well as equity awards. Fees may be paid in such form of consideration as is determined by the Board based on the recommendations of the Compensation Committee. Members of the Committee may not receive any compensation from the Company except for the fees that they receive for service as a member of the Board or any committee thereof.
